Make a Pollinator Seed Ball

Materials:

Air-dry clay Potting soil Seeds (easy to grow or native varieties) Ice cream scoop Tablespoon Plastic bags- sandwich or snack size

Directions

- Scoop one tablespoon of clay and roll it into a ball
- 2. Flatten the clay on a flat surface or between your hands
- 3. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon of potting soil in the middle and fold the clay around the soil. Mix soil into the clay (looks like cookies & cream)

- Flatten clay/soil mix and sprinkle a pinch of seeds in the middle and fold the clay around the seeds. Mix seeds into the clay so seeds are evenly dispersed throughout clay/soil
- 5. Roll into a ball. Place in a plastic bag with directions to take home.
- 6. Let air dry for a few days or place it outside on the bare ground.
- 7. Water (either rain or hand watering) will melt the clay. Once the environment is favorable the seeds will germinate.

Topics to discuss while making the seed balls

- Annual vs perennial (Example seed packet lists plants- both annuals & perennials)
- What makes a good pollinator plant (native, nectar, variety of shapes, sizes, colors, and bloom times)
- What do seeds need to germinate- water, temperature, air, good location (like soil)
